The Long Night of Museums 2022: on Saturday, all over **Berlin**

Berlin, 25 August 2022

The preparations are in full swing, with 70 museums lined up ready and waiting and advance ticket sales looking very good. On 27 August Long Night of Museums is coming back after a two-year break, and you're invited to wander through Berlin's museums and enjoy a wide and varied programme of events and activities until long after dark - from 6 p.m. until 2 a.m.

Opening

The Long Night of Museums will be opened by **Bettina Jarasch**, the Mayor of the *Land* of Berlin, to the accompaniment of a dance performance at 6 p.m. on 27 August in front of the Altes Museum on the Museum Island.

Programme

Visitors to the Long Night of Museums have the unique opportunity to enjoy a wideranging programme of activities in the museums and in the open air while at the same time getting an overview of important current exhibitions in Berlin, from Schliemann's Worlds in the James Simon Gallery to Louise Bourgeois in the Gropius Bau to a chance to get a first impression of the exhibition rooms in the **Käthe Kollwitz Museum**. Schloss Biesdorf is offering a preview of its upcoming exhibition and the Märkisches Museum and the Museum Berggruen can be visited one last time before both close for several years for refurbishment. Tristan the Tyrannosaurus has returned just in time to the **Museum für Naturkunde** and is waiting to greet visitors until far into the night.

the ideal subject is nature, of course, and right now the new special exhibition on "Dinosaurs!". The Anne Frank Centre, too, is geared up and ready for the Long Night of Museums.

Through the Long Night of Museums

Starting points and meeting points from where you can set out to make a perfect sweep of the Long Night of Museums are located at the Lustgarten, Hamburger Bahnhof, Checkpoint Charlie and the Charlottenburg museum district. They are linked by shuttle buses departing at frequent intervals. In addition, individual mobility provision is being offered, developed jointly with Jelbi for the Long Night of Museums. On this evening, together with your ticket at the Jelbi pop-ups at the Long Night of Museums, you will get a voucher worth € 10, which you can redeem on the Jelbi app for a scooter or a bike, for car-sharing or a taxi ride (valid for one month).
